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Dear Julia Ann Marcum Chapter, NSDU prospective members,

It is time to begin thinking about the formal organizational process. This is a two step process. First is an organizational meeting attended only by the local chapter members. At this meeting we will adopt chapter bylaws and elect chapter officers. All members whose applications have been verified prior to that time will be considered organizing members. At some point following that meeting, the charter meeting will be held. The charter meeting will be attended by at least one member of the national board. I have been asked to submit potential dates for the charter meeting and am considering a Saturday in late August/early September. All members who join after the organizing meeting up to one year from the date of the charter meeting are considered charter members.

I am polling those of you who indicated an interest in joining the Julia Ann Marcum Chapter but are still working on your applications. The next deadline for submittal of applications to be verified would be to me by April 7. If not able to meet that date, the next opportunity would be around the end of June. The Organizing Secretary General wasn't sure of the summer meeting date. Once I receive the documentation, I have to prepare the final application and mail it to the Org Secy General. ### **National Society Daughters of the Union 1861-1865**

A new chapter of the National Society Daughters of the Union 1861-1865 is being organized in the Upper Cumberland area. The national society currently has 25 active chapters, four of which were organized in the last two years. The new local chapter is one of five chapters in the process of organzing and will be the second chapter in Tennessee, joining the Andrew Jackson Penny Chapter in Chattanooga chartered in 2010.

The new chapter will be named after Julia Ann Marcum who was born in Scott County, TN. She was granted a pension by a special act of Congress for wounds she received while helping to defend her home in 1861 at the age of 16. One of the fingers on her right hand was shot off and a bayonet was plunged through her skull and left eye. Julia died in 1936 and is buried in Whitely County, Kentucky.

Membership is open to any woman eighteen years of age or over provided she is a direct lineal or collateral descendant of a man or woman who rendered military or civil service to the Union during the years 1861-1865. Collateral descent refers to what is sometimes called an "uncle" line. This means the ancestor can be a half or full sibling of your direct ancestor. An example of collateral lineage would be your great-grandmother's brother. Cousins or relatives by marriage do not qualify. Legal adoption does not qualify for lineal or collateral descent. Junior membership is open to any female child under eighteen years of age who meets the eligibility requirements. Proof of service, including enlistment and discharge dates, is required as part of the application.

The objectives of the society are:

- To honor the memory of the men and women who contributed toward the preservation of the Union during the Civil War, extending over the years 1861-1865
- To foster a spirit of patriotism, loyalty and love of country
- To uphold the honor of the Flag of the United States of America
- ❖ To give financial aid to Lincoln Memorial University, Harrogate, Tennessee

The national society requires local chapters meet four times per year. The time and location for the meetings will be determined by the new chapter members. The membership application fee is \$15. Annual national dues are \$10. There are no state dues and chapter dues will be established by the chapter members and will include a \$5 contribution per member to Lincoln Memorial University.

Twelve women have already submitted their applications and another five are in the process of gathering their documentation. ### Relationship between Richard Fielding Cooke and Bailey Bockman

Written and submitted by Dr. Jamie Lynn Coburn

Richard Fielding Cooke, for whom Cookeville, Putnam County, Tennessee is named, served in the 29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> Tennessee General Assemblies, 1851-1855. He represented the counties of White, Fentress, Jackson, Overton and Van Buren in the 29<sup>th</sup> General Assembly. He represented the counties of White, Jackson and Macon in the 30<sup>th</sup> General Assembly. He was born in Culpeper County, Virginia, 08 Jul 1878, son of Robert and Susanna (Watson) Cooke. He attended elementary school in Virginia and North Carolina. He married Margaret Cox on 31 March 31 1813 in Edgefield, South Carolina. In the War of 1812, he enlisted 20 Sep 1814 as sergeant in Captain Abraham Dulaney's Company, Major Woodfolk's 3<sup>rd</sup> Regiment. He was promoted to 3<sup>rd</sup> lieutenant on 01 Oct 1814, then to 2<sup>nd</sup> lieutenant 01 Dec 1814. On the 1850 Census he is residing in Jackson County, Tennessee. In 1860 and 1870 he is residing in Double Springs, Putnam County Tennessee. He died 15 Oct 1870 for and is buried at Cooke Cemetery in Baxter, Putnam County, Tennessee.

Richard Fielding Cooke and his wife, Margaret Cox, had 9 children: Attaline, Minerva, Zenira, Harriet, Bolivar Houston, Dorinda, Calvin Whitley, Louisa, and Watson McSwain.<sup>1</sup>

Zenira Cooke (Richard Fielding Cooke) was born 23 Apr 1821 in Tennessee.<sup>7, 3</sup> She died Nov 21 1868 and is buried in Cooke Cemetery, Baxter, Putnam, Tennessee.<sup>7</sup> She appears on the 1860 Census, residing in Pekin, Putnam County, Tennessee.<sup>8</sup> She was married to Robert Logan Lindsay.<sup>8</sup> They had the following 8 children: Harriet Albina, Mary Jane, Robert Bolivar, Byrd Constantine, Millard Fillmore, Watson Cooke, Horace W, and A R. <sup>8</sup>

Mary Jane Lindsay (Zenira Cooke Lindsay, Richard Fielding Cooke) was born 02 Feb 1849 in Jackson County, Tennessee. She married William Trousdale Bockman in 1870. She appears on the 1880 and 1900 Census residing in Putnam County, Tennessee. She and William Trousdale Bockman had 8 children: Leon Deburney, Clarence Lindon, Bertie Orlando; John William Lindsay, Robert Roenza "Roe", Watson Eugene, Hattie Roxanne, Rosa Blanche. Springs died 09 Mar 1922 and is buried in Double Springs Cemetery, in Double Springs, Putnam County, Tennessee.

William Trousdale Bockman, husband of Mary Jane Lindsay, was born 14 Mar 1849 in Tennessee. <sup>9, 11</sup> He was residing in Putnam County, Tennessee on the 1880 and 1900 Census. <sup>10, 11</sup> He died 04 Dec 1918 and is buried at Double Springs Cemetery in Double Springs, Putnam County, Tennessee. <sup>9</sup>

Leon Deburney Bockman (Mary Jane Lindsay Bockman, Zenira Cooke Lindsay, Richard Fielding Cooke) was born 15 Dec 1871 in Putnam County, Tennessee. <sup>6, 12</sup> In 1910 and 1920, he is residing in Putnam County, Tennessee. He married Nancy Jane Holman in 1900. They had 5 children: Sally Myrtle, Eugene, James William, Bailey, and Charles "Charlie" Holman. He married Martha E Rice on 29 Jun 1913, in Putnam County,

Tennessee. <sup>13</sup>They had the following 2 children: Miriam and Ruth. He died 20 Jan 1944 in Sparta, White County, Tennessee. <sup>12</sup> He is buried in Cookeville, Putnam County, Tennessee, Cookeville City Cemetery. <sup>12</sup>

Nancy Jane Holman was born 22 Jan 1877 in Putnam County, Tennessee. <sup>6</sup> She died 28 Dec 1911 in Putnam County Tennessee<sup>6</sup> and is buried at Cookeville City Cemetery. <sup>12</sup>

Bailey Bockman (Leon Deburney Bockman, Mary Jane Lindsay Bockman, Zenira Cooke Lindsay, Richard Fielding Cooke) was born 11 Mar 1907 in Cookeville, Putnam County Tennessee. <sup>14, 15</sup> He appears on the 1920 Census residing in Cookeville, Putnam County, Tennessee. <sup>16</sup> In 1940, he is in Sparta, White County, Tennessee. <sup>17</sup>He married Christine Jarvis 20 Jan 1929 in Putnam County, Tennessee. <sup>13,18</sup> He served as Senator in the 81<sup>st</sup> General Assembly, 1959-1961. <sup>18</sup> He served, White, Bledsoe, Cumberland, Meigs, Rhea, Sequatchie and Van Buren Counties. <sup>18</sup> He died 23 Mar 1965 in Sparta, White County, Tennessee and is buried in Highland Cemetery. <sup>14, 18, 19</sup>

### **Upper Cumberland Place Names**

**Dale Hollow**-Clay County. William Dale resided in bordering Overton County in 1830. Twenty years later, a portion of Overton went to help constitute Clay County. Elizabeth Dale is also listed as a local resident. The map designation may owe to one both of these individuals, although some believe attribution of the place named goes to an 1808 settler named William Dale(possibly an ancestor of the one named (above?) who was engaged in determining in Tennessee-Kentucky boundary.

**Davenport**-Warren County. One family of settles in this vicinity had the Davenport surname. The community traces to them.

**Davidson**-Fentress County. A person who owned mines here is said to be the source of the place mane.

**Daylight**-Warren County. An account in an early Warren County history includes more than one version of the possible name selection process. The most entertaining one holds that Harvey Dodd, Oliver Towles, and US Knight were conferring what to name the Hamlet. It is said that Knight preferred "Knight". Some others being Yager (for local storekeeper Ed Yager's) an Hickory Grove. Obliviously Daylight won out.

Day's Crossroads Macon County. At the time of the 1850 census, Thomas B Day was a local citizen. It is likely he resided near the intersecting roads here. Another source discloses the presence of the Dodd surname in the area business. Turner, Day, & Woolworth Manufacturing produced ax handles in nearly Lafayette, while Day& Allen operated a stage line with service between Lafayette and nearby county seats.

**Daysville**-Cumberland County. Although little detail could be found, the place is said to have been names for a pioneer with the surname of Days (or Day). A family having this last name is said to have settled on Mammy's Creek. In 1901, George W Day was appointed postmaster.

**Denny**-Putnam County. One map lists a community called Denny Seminary in Putnam County, an institutions that was probably located at this site. In 1870, three Dennys resided nearby; James, age 52; John S, 44; and Johnathan, 50

**Dibrell-**Warren County. There were many Dibrells in this region, some in Warren County and White County just to the northeast. A General Dibrell served in the Civil War. Among the Dibrells who populated this general area were Anthony, Mary E, Mildred. G.G., M. C., W.L. and George G.

**Difficult**- Smith County. Either the establishment of a post-office at the site, or a name suggested for such an office was rejected by the Post Office Department as being too difficult; whereupon the designation Difficult was itself adapted

**Ditty-** Putnam County. Abraham and John Ditty were local citizens in 1830. Andy Derry, A H and Sarah Ditty lived in the county when the 1870 census was taken. The place name probably traces back to these families.

**Dixon Springs**-*Smith County*. In 1799, the first county court convened for a three day meeting at the home of Major Tillman Dixon. The locality was labeled Dixon Springs for a freshwater spring on the west side of Major Dixon's home. The creek feeding the area is Dixon Creek and the historical home, which still stands, is known as Dixonia. An obscure reference is also found in old county records to a Don Cl Dixon, circa 1837. Any connection between to two in not readily evident.

**Dodson Branch** *Jackson County*. Although the site designated as Dodson Branch is on the opposite side of the county from Smith County, there may be a relationship to the Dodsons of Smith County. (A portion of Smith County contributed to the makeup of Jackson County.) James Dodson was a Smith County resident in 1840. "Branch" refers to a branch of Spring Creek.

**Donoho** *Smith County*. E.C. and F.W. Donoho are known to have lived in Smith County when the 1830 census of Middle Tennessee was recorded. One of them, or one of their ancestors or descendants, probably inspired this site to be so designated.

**Dorton** Cumberland County. According to Cumberland County's First Hundred Years, this location was named for James W Dorton. The name was assigned about 1900 by railroad officials out of respect for Dorton, who served as their local attorney. When the 1870 census was taken, Azariah, Joseph, and Nancy Dorton also called this county home.

**Double Springs** *Putnam County* There are said to be five mineral springs at this locality. Perhaps only two of them were discovered at first, inspiring the Double Springs name.

**Dowell Town** *DeKalb County*. The settlement was developed beginning in about 1867 by W. Frank Dowell after whom the post office was named. Later, the town itself became known by his surname. One source gives 1876 as the year of founding incorporation took place in 1949.

**Draper's Crossroads** *Macon County*. Isaac and Joshua Draper lived nearby in 1850. By 1870, Andrew J Draper, age 48, was a resident of the neighborhood. The intersection was probably named for them or some member of the Draper clan. One map calls the community simply Draper.

**Dudney Hill** *Jackson County*. In 1850, Patrick N and Shelby Dudney resided in this vicinity. However, as early as 1820, records show the local residency of Ann Dudney. It is likely their surname was applied to the community at this elevation.

**Eastland** White County. Local records disclose the marriages of several Eastland. George and Charles, both in 1835 and Robert M in 1843, Thomas Eastland held a large parcel of land here; the place is probably named after him. Were it not for the existence

of persons with this surname, one might assume the designation was the hamlet's location, in the extreme eastern portion of the county.

**Eastport** *Pickett County*. Eastport is located on the Obey River and no doubt goods were shipped on the river from this location, accounting for the "port". The "East: part of the name is somewhat mystifying; the town is in one of the southernmost sections of the county.

**Elmwood** *Smith County*. American elms and slippery elms grew throughout Tennessee. This site was name for a prominent stand of one variety or the other.

**Enon** *Macon County* In the New Testament, a site called Aenon is mentioned. This designation is probably a shortened version of it, and was probably favored because if was terse and euphonious.

**Ensor** *Putnam County*. The only Ensor who can be placed in this general area was Ruth, a Jackson County resident in 1830. Jackson County is immediately north of Putnam and portions of it were taken to help make up Putnam. Probably in the portion taken from Jackson was this community of Ensor.

**Evins Mills** *DeKalb County*. In 1870 John Evins, then age 51, resided in the county. It is likely he, or some members of his family ran a mill at this location and gave the family name to the site.

While building a network of people with similar interests is an important aspect of virtual networking, some people are not comfortable "friending" total strangers. Services like Facebook and Google+ offer other ways to connect with other genealogists without adding them to your inner circle.

On Facebook, you can join "groups" and participate in all sorts of discussions. This same concept is known as "communities" on Google+. There is no shortage of genealogy-related groups on either service. These groups/communities allow you to post relevant information (say, a new online record set that may be of interest to the people in the group) and ask and answer questions. You can also be a silent participant and simply follow along, picking up information and tips from the others in the group.

There are tons of groups/communities to choose from. To find genealogy-related groups on Facebook, type the word "genealogy" into the search box, and at the bottom of the list choose "See more results for 'genealogy." On Google+, type the word "genealogy" into the search box and hit the enter key. At the top of the results page, click on "Communities."
